THE SYRIA CRISIS

The civil war in Syria began in 2011, between government forces and rebels. In 2014, the militant group ISIS (Islamic State in Iraq and al-Sham) joined the fighting.

Countless children have been killed in the violence, and millions of families have been forced to flee their homes. Many have left the country, while others are living under attack in Syria, unable to access clean water, food, health care or education.

MEET MUHAMMAD

When eight-year-old Muhammad first arrived at Za'atari refugee camp three years ago, he was angry, nervous and would get into fights with other children.

He now goes to the Dreamland Centre, a safe space supported by Unicef, where children can escape the trauma of war.

At the centre, Muhammad does arts and crafts and learns life skills training. He goes to informal school classes and plays football with his friends.

Muhammad says, "They teach us how to read and write and memorise, then we go out and play. I love playing football at the centre. I like to play with my friends and not be enemies. We shouldn't fight each other."

With your help, Unicef can make sure 2.2 million Syrian children are enrolled in school this year. The money you raise will give children like Muhammad a chance to play and learn.

Together, we can give Syrian children hope for a better future.


